## Gang goes global - the spreading of gang culture

Where does it come from, what do we know and what can we do about it?

Problems with criminal networks in the Scandinavian countries have often been associated with hooliganism, biker gangs and activities within jails.

In the last decade, however we have watched this kind of activity spread and grow among our youth, in our neighbourhoods, schools and in the streets, turning young people against the norms and laws of the society and against each other. Although the emerging youth gangs have local characteristics, the mechanism including gang recruitment, rituals, violence, organisation and the kinds of gangs that lead to criminal activities are universal.

How can we best understand this alarming development and what can we do about it?

May 20 we have the honour to invite you to a full day workshop with Dr Barry Glick from New York State.

Barry is a Counselling Psychologist, and former juvenile justice administrator who has devoted his entire professional career to working with at-risk youth and families.

Dr. Glick has served in a variety of professional and voluntary roles for youth development and programming. He is Member Emeritus of the National Youth Gangs

Advisory Board, and provides organisational and program consultation to government and private agencies serving at-risk youth and families.

Barry Glick has published numerous books and articles, most recently: "Cognitive Behavioural Interventions for at Risk Youth" and developed a first hand knowledge of the gang culture. Dr Glick will guide us through the current research and best practices in the area of gang prevention.

This workshop should be most interesting to all professionals, policy makers and others who are involved in solving these problems.
